<b>Catholic Housing Services</b> (formerly Archdiocesan Housing Authority) (206) 328-5731 <a href="http://www.ccsww.org">www.ccsww.org</a>	Shelter and transitional programs for homeless and low-income persons.
<b>ArtSpace Projects</b> (206) 709-7611 <a href="http://www.artspaceusa.org">www.artspaceusa.org</a>	Nonprofit developer of affordable live-work space for artists.
<b>Building Changes</b> (206) 322-9444 <a href="http://www.buildingchanges.org">www.buildingchanges.org</a>	A Seattle-based nonprofit that develops HIV/AIDS housing locally and provides technical assistance nationally.
<b>Capitol Hill Housing</b> (206) 329-7303 <a href="http://www.chhip.org">www.chhip.org</a>	Offers secure, comfortable and affordable housing for individuals and families across a broad range of incomes.
<b>Central Area Development Association (CADA)</b> (206) 328-2240 <a href="http://www.cada.org">www.cada.org</a>	Affordable multifamily apartments, mixed used developments and community programs in the Central Area.
<b>Compass Housing Alliance</b> (merger of LATCH and the Compass Center) (206) 789-1536 <a href="http://www.latch.org">www.latch.org</a>	Builds safe and nurturing communities that recognize the right to affordable housing, the importance of self-determination, and the value of mutual respect.
<b>Delridge Neighborhoods Development Association (DNDA)</b> (206) 923-0917 <a href="http://www.dnda.org/housing">www.dnda.org/housing</a>	Affordable housing resource program, offering housing that is less expensive than for-profit buildings so that families with lower incomes can always live in Delridge.
<b>Downtown Emergency Service Center</b> (206) 464-1570 <a href="http://www.desc.org">www.desc.org</a>	Serve disabled and vulnerable homeless adults, providing a variety of housing options, which all include case management and/or on-site coordination of support services.
<b>Habitat for Humanity</b> of Seattle/South King County (206) 292-5240 <a href="http://www.seattle-habitat.org">www.seattle-habitat.org</a>	A homeownership program with homeowners investing hundreds of hours of labor (sweat equity) into building their Habitat house and pay a no-profit, no-interest mortgage.
<b>Homesight</b> (206) 760-4200 <a href="http://www.homesightwa.org">www.homesightwa.org</a>	A homeownership program offering home buyer education classes, counseling and purchase assistance loans to first time homebuyers.
<b>Homestead Community Land Trust</b> (206) 323-1227 <a href="http://www.homesteadclt.org">www.homesteadclt.org</a>	A homeownership program offering assistance to help low- and moderate-income clients purchase their first homes. The land remains in trust, resale price is capped and homes must be sold to low-income clients or back to the agency.

<b>Inter*Im Community Development Association</b> (206) 624-1802 <a href="http://www.interimicda.org">www.interimicda.org</a>	Affordable housing development in Seattle's International District and the larger Asian/Pacific community.
<b>Low Income Housing Institute (LIHI)</b> (206) 443-9935 <a href="http://www.lihi.org">www.lihi.org</a>	Develops, owns and operates housing for the benefit of low-income and homeless families and individuals.
<b>Mt. Baker Housing Association</b> (206) 725-4152 <a href="http://www.mtbakerhousing.org">www.mtbakerhousing.org</a>	Owns and operates apartments in the Rainier Valley for low-income persons, mostly with Section 8 rental assistance.
<b>Plymouth Housing Group (PHG)</b> (206) 374-9409 <a href="http://www.plymouthhousing.org">www.plymouthhousing.org</a>	Providing affordable housing and supportive services to people in transition from city streets to permanent homes.
<b>Seattle Chinatown International District Preservation and Development Authority (SCIDPDA)</b> (206) 624-8929 <a href="http://www.scidpda.org/housing">www.scidpda.org/housing</a>	Provides opportunities for low to moderate-income individuals, families, and seniors to afford a safe and decent place to live in the heart of the bustling Chinatown International District, near the city center and city jobs.
